## Emergencies

### Fire

If the fire alarm sounds, you must immediately leave everything and go to the **garden area adjacent to the car park outside of Stratton** and line up in fire list order (you will be shown exactly how this is done during the first fire drill). You need to remain silent so that a register can be taken, and instructions can be given. You will be told when you can return to your rooms. If you discover a fire, you should not attempt to tackle it yourself, but you should activate the nearest fire alarm. Evacuation of the building should be immediate, and you should not endanger yourself. There are several fire exits throughout the House. You must familiarise yourself with these exits, and in the event of a fire alarm, you must evacuate the building by your nearest exit.

## Illness after 'Lights Out'

If you are ill in the night and require assistance, call the duty phone. Do not send a message but make a telephone call to 07743 833119. If you are unable to use your phone to call the make your way to the front door of the Housemaster's flat and ring the doorbell.

## Roll Calls and Signing out

For legal reasons (and common sense) you must sign in and out of the house using the card system. It must be clear where you are at any point during the day. Roll call must be attended at 18.50 every evening (21.00 on Sunday). Attendance is mandatory, and you must inform duty staff in advance if you are going to miss one. As well as checking everyone is present, roll calls are vital for giving out notices and information.

### **Layout of Stratton**

One of the best aspects of Stratton is that it is a mixed house. This encourages you to form friendships and support networks with all the boarders in Sixth Form. To provide a safe environment for all, there are strict rules that must be always adhered to. **Under no circumstance should a boy be on the girls' side of the house or a girl on the boys'.** Every pupil has a right to a 'safe space' and should feel comfortable to roam around on their side of the house without the worry of being around the opposite sex. There will be serious consequences if this rule is broken.

Year 12 are accommodated in either single or double rooms. You will be expected to move each term.

Year 13 are accommodated in single rooms.

The girls' rooms are on the left side and separated from the boys. Girls have their own common room and kitchen.

The boys' rooms are located on the right side where the mixed common room and kitchen are located.

Toilets and showering facilities are located on each floor of the House.

The MCR and kitchen are located on the ground floor. The MCR is the social hub of the House and is used for relaxing, cooking and television. The Matron, Mrs Bridgwater, also has her office in the lobby. In addition, each side of the house has laundry facilities.

Roll calls take place in the MCR.

The computer room is located next to the MCR. This can be used by all pupils.

Mr Lea's flat is located on the ground floor next to the office.

Miss Brooks' flat is located on the ground floor opposite the laundry room on the boys' side.

Mr & Mrs Redwood-Loud's flat is located on the girls' side on the first floor.

## **Responsibilities**

### **Housemaster, Assistant Housemaster & Graduate Assistant (all resident)**

The Housemaster is responsible for the running of the House and is supported by the Assistant and Graduate Assistant. Together we are the permanently resident staff and share Stratton as our home alongside you. We are responsible for your safety & welfare, and in conjunction with the academic tutors, matrons and domestic team, we aim to ensure that you are healthy, happy and achieving your best in all aspects of school life.

## **House Tutors**

A team of academic tutors help to ensure a good working atmosphere during prep and offer any support before bedtime each weekday. They are in house from 5.15pm-10pm. They may also be available to open facilities between 8.30pm-9.30pm i.e. Townroe, Gym, Astro turf.

## **Matrons**

Our Matrons, Mrs Bridgwater & Mrs Cakebread, are crucial to the smooth running of Stratton. They are important points of contact for the pupils each day. In addition, they coordinate travel arrangements, oversee the domestic team, assist with visits to hospital, and help to check that the fabric of the building is being looked after (as well as a multitude of other things – they are the backbone of the daily running of Stratton House).



## Domestic Team

Our dedicated team of cleaners, led by Susanna, do an excellent job every day to ensure that your living conditions are clean and tidy. Stratton is a large area to cover, and they do not have time to pick up clothes from the floor, make beds or tidy desks – those tasks are your responsibilities, they are here to clean your rooms, not to tidy up after you. Do your best to make their job as easy as possible. Our cleaners do a superb job that is not always very pleasant, so please greet them when you see them and show them the respect they deserve.

## Catering Team

The catering team also work tirelessly to ensure that you are well fed. Please ensure you show your thanks at mealtimes.

## House Owls

House Owls are what we call our Stratton Boarding Prefects and are selected from Year 13 following applications made in Y12. Their job is to support the smooth running of the house and assist you during your time in Stratton. They should be excellent role models of trust & respect and therefore will be useful peers to go to for advice. Alongside the Owls are 'honorary Owls' who have also been recognised for their values but will serve their main duty to the school as School Prefects. However, they will also be more than happy to assist you within boarding.

Their key roles are to:

- set a good example of being trustworthy and respectful
- manage their 'family' with the help of their deputy
- assist with the smooth running of the House
- help identify any potential problems and to encourage new pupils to integrate into school life
- liaise with the House Team to identify any issues and improvements
- attend regular meetings with the Housemaster (HM)
- to assist at check-in and wider duties
- lead House assemblies and assist with House events

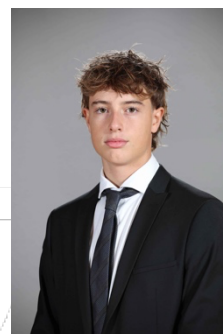

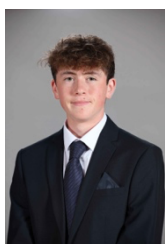

## Expectations of Behaviour

### Bullying

Bullying is viewed as any repetitive and consistent behaviour – verbal, physical or online – that makes an individual feel worried, unhappy, or distressed. It is never tolerated. Each pupil has the right to be respected and feel valued by teachers and other pupils. If you are unhappy with how other pupils are treating you it is vital that you communicate this to a member of staff as quickly as possible. Hopefully you will feel comfortable talking to me, but there are a variety of other people whom you can approach including the resident staff HM, AHM and Grad, Matrons, House Tutors, your subject teachers, sports coaches, your tutor, friends, or the nurses. We also have an independent listening service who, if you and your HM feel you need more discussion time, can be arranged for you.

Bullying is viewed as a very serious matter throughout the school. It can lead to suspension and expulsion. You should be confident that if you are being bullied you will be listened to and offered help, as appropriate. It is also equally important that you pass on any concerns about other pupils in the house, if you feel that they are being bullied.

In Stratton we want to create an environment where pupils feel confident to speak out against any poor behaviour from their peers and never tolerate bullying. “All that is necessary for evil to succeed is for good people to do nothing” – *John Stuart Mill*. This quotation should be a mantra by which the pupils in Stratton live. Don't be a bystander. Call out behavior that is not in line with our values of Trust and Respect.

### Anti-social Behaviour & Equality

*“Anti-social behaviour is anything that breaks down the sense of community that we are trying to build. Anti-social behaviour affects everyone in Stratton and is unacceptable. As with bullying, we will not tolerate any behaviour that seeks to exclude others due to their race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender or religious beliefs. This is not an exhaustive list. Any form of unequal treatment will lead to serious consequences. Stratton is an anti-racist, sexist-free establishment. These are the worst forms of anti-social behaviour, and you should never indulge in it yourself or “protect” others if you know they are involved. Please speak to me or a member of staff if you have any concerns. Stratton proudly supports all LGBTIQ+ rights. It is everyone's responsibility to ensure Stratton is a safe and equal environment for all. We have three ‘equality ambassadors’ to support any issues or concerns you may be facing, and they can speak to a member of staff on your behalf.”*

## Fabric of the Building

Looking after the fabric of the building is also very important. The building is old and maintenance is a constant struggle. Mr Lea is doing his very best to update decoration as and when is possible. Take pride in Stratton and ensure that it is kept in a state that is pleasant for everyone to live in. If you damage something in the House, please report it immediately. Accidents will happen, but please be honest in the event of any damage. And clean up after yourself in the laundry, in your bedroom, in the common room and most importantly – **in the kitchen.**

## Relationships

Living in close proximity may lead to romantic relationships. Although we do not encourage this, we understand it is a part of life. To ensure Stratton remains comfortable and inclusive to everyone, certain rules must be followed. These can be found in the office and a member of staff will talk you through compliance.

## Sanctions

In an ideal world there would be no need for a sanctions system, but they are in place across the school, and in house too, to support our Matron and the house staff, the tutors, and the HM. They also provide pupils with clear guidelines. All school rules apply within the house; thus these sanctions are used when rules and conventions are broken.

I must draw your attention to the fact that the following infractions will be treated in an extremely serious manner:

- Being on the opposite sex's side of the house
- Smoking, including vaping
- Consumption of alcoholic drinks
- Bullying/Racism
- Sexual harassment and explicit sexual relations

## Valuables

It is your responsibility to keep valuables secure. Make sure they are locked away when you are not in Stratton.



## Mobile phones

Phones can only be used in your free time. They must not be used when walking around campus, in lessons, in study periods, during activities, during prep or after lights out. As it is a sixth-form house, you are expected to manage your relationship with your phone and exercise common sense, ensuring it does not negatively affect your mental wellbeing or your work.

There is a big push on the culture of phone use in the school and we will be looking to introduce more detailed guidance about how often and how much we recommend you are using your phones during in the House.

## Pocket Money & Passports

We operate a system of trust in Stratton, but you should never carry large sums of cash. We will keep your money in the office safe if you have a large amount. Hopefully, you will have your own bank account with a cash card to keep your money secure.

**All passports** should be handed into the office for safekeeping.

## Weekends

The normal signing in/out rules apply at weekends as during the week. You can visit Warminster town centre and are also welcome to take the train to Bath, but you must inform Duty Staff that you are leaving the house and return in time for Roll Call. If you wish to travel further afield then your parents are required to give permission via email.

## Overnight at weekends

If you are a full boarder, written permission needs to be granted by your parent/guardian for you to leave school overnight at the weekend, or in the case of a visit to the home of a friend, permission from the hosts too.

If you want to leave for the weekend, you should first check the calendar to see if you have a sporting, academic or school commitment that weekend. If clear, you should ask your parents to complete a firefly form detailing arrangements for the weekend. This should be done by the Wednesday evening, at the latest, before the weekend requested.

If you are visiting another pupil's house and/or travelling in someone else's car, then I need both your parent's permission and the permission of the host family – this can be relayed via email. The House Staff and your parents **must** know your location during the weekend. Furthermore, you cannot travel in a car, or stay in a hotel (or equivalent) with anyone under the age of 25.

Pupils should return from weekends in time for 9pm roll call on Sunday evening.

## **Exeat weekends/end of terms - Forms**

Pupils are encouraged to leave school over an exeat weekend as there are no school activities. Parents should complete the 'out of house' firefly form informing the school of the weekend plans.

Firefly > type 'Stratton' into search > House Forms > Out of House Form  
If you are staying in over the exeat weekend you should complete the '**quiet weekend**' form.

If you will be going to a specific place regularly, your parents can complete the '**annual exeat permission**' form.

The '**Travel form**' should be completed for the end of term **a week before the end of term**. This is so the school can arrange transport/taxis if necessary.

Please speak to the House Staff or Owls if you need guidance on completing these forms.

## **Mid-week overnight absence**

These should be avoided but are obviously granted in exceptional circumstances.

## **Permissions**

There are a variety of situations that require specific sets of parental/guardian permissions unique to each combination of circumstances. The golden rule is that you must always let staff know where you will be before you go if you are planning to leave the school site. Please refer to the helpful FAQs section which should answer most questions about common situations that require written permission.

## Academic & School Matters

### Prep

This is an extremely important part of the school day and the expectation is that you make the most of this time set aside for study. Prep takes place in Stratton Monday to Friday. You must be in your room immediately after roll call and ready to start work at 19.00. Movement between dorms during prep should be kept to a minimum. Prep finishes at 20.30 and if you finish your work before the end of Prep you should read a book, revise or carry on with a quiet task. You may go to Townroe (the Sixth Form center) to complete your prep if you wish.

### Expectations of Prep:

Below are the guidelines as set in Stratton for independent learning:

- Pupils must have everything they need ready before the start of prep at 19.00.
- There should be little to no movement in corridors
- Tutors will move around the house during prep and so you can expect to see them in your rooms at some stage during the evening.
- Pupils work right up until the end of prep at 20.30
- There is absolutely no reason why a Sixth Form pupil should ever have “no work to do”. You should be consolidating your learning and making revision notes as you go along.
- Loud music should not be played through speakers, especially in shared rooms. Speakers will be confiscated if misused.

### After Prep:

There are plenty of activities available after prep to help you relax before bedtime. These include the opening of the astro for sport, use of the swimming pool during summer, gym and the sports hall. If you wish to go for a run or a walk you must inform the Tutor before you go. Alternatively, you can relax in one of common rooms, have downtime in your own bedroom or come & chill with us in the office – we love the company!

## Sixth Form Study Periods

Study periods, shown on your timetable, are not free periods. The expectation is that you undertake independent work to advance your academic progress. Year 12s can work in Townroe or the Library. **Year 12s are not allowed to spend study periods in Stratton.** Year 12s can return to house for breaks. Year 13s can work in Stratton, Townroe or the Library.

## Meals

For your sake (to perform well in class and in other areas of school life) you should attend all meals. Breakfasts are compulsory for all (except Owls who will eat in Stratton) and you will be checked in every morning by a member of staff. If there are aspects of the food that you do not like, then tell the Food Committee representative. The Committee meets regularly, and the Catering Manager takes its views seriously. Do not simply complain to your peers; do something constructive.

## Uniform

You must wear full suits during the school day. You may wear your own clothes at the weekend unless you are attending a sports fixture. See firefly or notice in the office for full uniform rules.

## General House Information

You are responsible for the tidiness of your own areas. You cannot work to maximum effect if your room is a mess.

## Kitchen

This is for the preparation of drinks and snacks. These should not be a substitute for regular school meals and therefore only the microwave, kettle and toaster appliances can be used during the weekday. As meals are optional over the weekend, you are permitted to use the oven to cook but you must sign out the key in the office. The kitchen must be kept tidy, and it is everyone's responsibility to clean up after use.

## **Mixed Common Room**

This is for the use of everyone in the House. It needs to be a happy and inclusive place. No one has priority over any of the facilities or spaces. It is the pupil's responsibility to keep this area tidy. Other than the Owl family on duty, boarders must depart the MCR by 10:15pm.

## **Girls' Common Room**

This is for the use of girls only. Under no circumstance should boys be in this common room. Girls must depart the GCR at 10:15pm.

## **Laundry**

Dirty laundry must be taken to the MCR after roll call on Sunday Night (all except bedding) Smaller items, such as socks, should be placed in a named net bag. It is essential that all your clothes, including non-school items, are clearly labelled. Bedding should be taken to the MCR at 9pm on Monday night.

Each wing of the house has its own laundry room if you wish to do your own laundry. Please be respectful of this and take your washing out as soon as it has finished.

## **Music**

This can be played in your rooms during your free time providing it cannot be heard from outside the room. Music should not be played through speakers during study periods, Prep or after 22.00. This is a Sixth Form house and many pupils choose to go to bed earlier. Please turn off music (and your lights) if you are not in your room.

## **Microsoft Teams & Notices**

Almost all communication will be posted on the Stratton Teams Page. All boarders must have access to the House Microsoft Team and check it regularly. Most of the information you need to know is also communicated at roll call or by your tutor during tutor time. Please also check the whiteboard in the entrance hall for any notices.



## **Food deliveries**

The food provided at the school is suitable for all your dietary needs. You are not permitted to order take-aways during the week unless you are an Owl. Weekend takeaways are permitted but should not be ordered past 21.00.

## **Posters**

You are welcome to put up posters in your room, but only using white tack. The poster must not be offensive and the HM will be the arbiter of acceptability.

## **Medical Centre**

If you are feeling unwell or require medical assistance you should see the Matron or duty tutor. During school you should go to the medical center. Under no circumstance are you permitted to take yourself off to bed without informing a member of staff in Stratton. If you wake up unwell you must come downstairs and inform the duty staff. This is so we can keep an eye on your wellbeing and track your health reliably.

## **Self-medication**

Pupils may be required to self-medicate. Please make this known to the Matron and nurse so you can complete the required forms. Certain medication will have to be locked away in the office and you will be able to access it through the Matron. Medication of any description should not be kept in your room without completing a self-medication form.

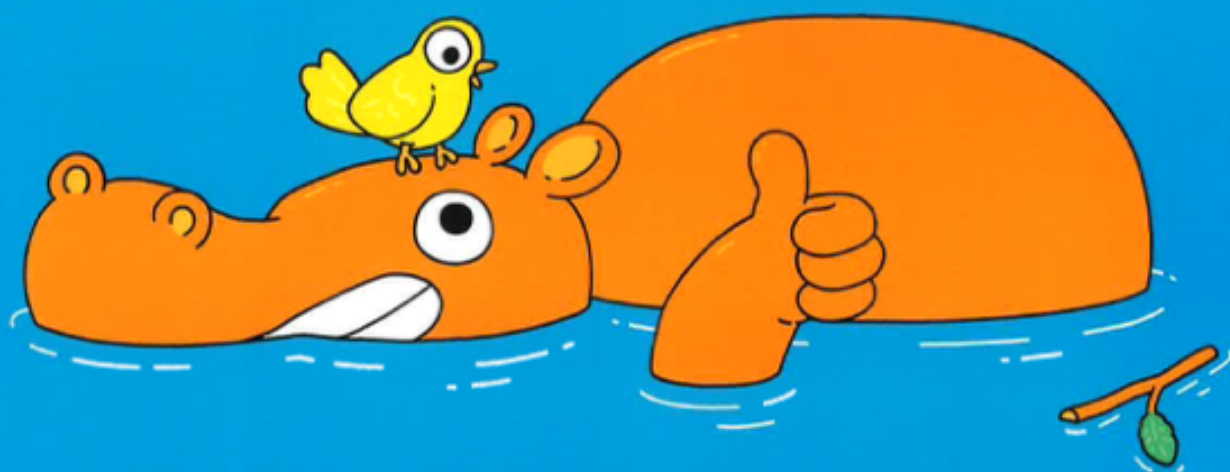

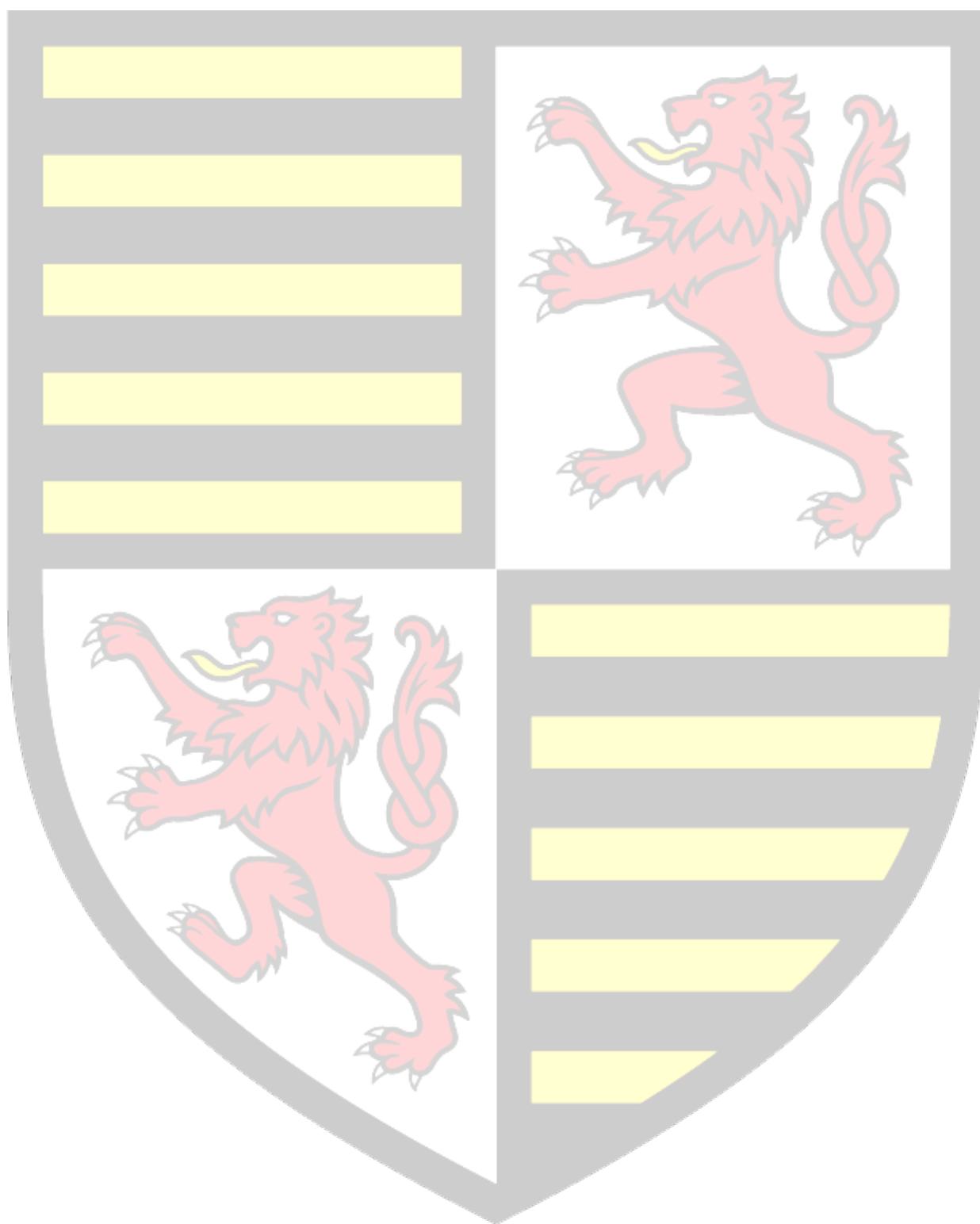
